Parish Property Matters

On a couple of occasions this year, I've discussed with the Parish Pastoral Council the condition of the church grounds. Those of you who have been into the presbytery back garden in recent times will know that it's very overgrown and that, in parts, there are brambles and nettles. All of you will have noticed how the perimeter privet hedge on Kemp Street, Lord Street and Warren Street has grown too high. It has also grown too thick to allow the iron railings to be repaired and painted.

My cousin, Bernard Pendleton (*who works at Myerscough College*), has kindly arranged for a team from Kirkham Prison to tackle these problems. I met with the team supervisors a few weeks ago and they started work last Monday. Their first priority will be the back garden. They then propose to remove the privet hedge, repair and paint the railings and replant in the spring with a variety of hedging, e.g. beech, wild fuschia, hawthorn, rose of Sharon, etc.,. The labour will be free, but, obviously we will have to pay for the materials. I hope you approve? *Fr. Michael*

P.S. I hope in the next few months to start thinking about the damp problems that we seem to have both in the church and presbytery. Your advice and help will be very much appreciated.

Next Sunday's Gospel

for the Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

(19th. October) - Matthew 22 : 15-21 giving God his due

They must really have thought they had their victim sewn up! If Jesus said he paid the Roman taxes, he recognised the Emperor, not God, as his Lord. If he said he didn't pay, he was a traitor to Rome. Jesus turns the question back on them. First, he makes them admit that they themselves recognise Rome as overlord by carrying a Roman coin, for the coin would carry the Emperor's head. Next, he puts them a question: what do they consider is due to Caesar? Finally, he goes beyond their question, to interrogate their ultimate loyalty: in the last analysis, just what is due to God? At a superficial level, this seems a little verbal tussle, in which Jesus outwits his opponents. But the story was remembered and passed on in the Christian community not because of Jesus' cleverness, but because, at a deeper level, it is a question which Jesus puts to each of us: just where do our loyalties and priorities lie? Money? Respect? Sex? Fame? A good holiday? Comfort? Power? Jesus is not a dictator who imposes his will. He just asks the question and leaves us to give our own answer. To those who question him he gives no easy response but always replies with another question.

What takes priority in my life? Does God get a look-in? In what way?
